EGTON BRIDGE OLD GOOSEBERRY SOCIETY

Growing gooseberries on a competitive basis seems to have started in Lancashire, Cheshire and the Midlands, where the moist climate favoured gooseberries. The first Gooseberry Clubs were being formed around the Manchester area by the 1740's, where Weavers in the Textile Industry were particularly keen on developing new varieties of gooseberry, as well as growing ever larger specimens for their Annual Shows.

The first National Register of Gooseberry Show results was produced in 1786 and was to be an annual publication, listing all shows and prize winners. By 1831 there were some 722 varieties of gooseberry and in 1845 a total of 171 Gooseberry Shows were held. From 1786 the size of prize winning berries had trebled, but the records of today are only marginally heavier than they were over 100 years ago.

The mania for growing enormous gooseberries began to die out during the latter half of the nineteenth century, perhaps due to changes in the way of life of the Weavers, as power driven looms replaced the handloom. The National Register of 1893 lists 73 shows, mostly named after the Public House where they were traditionally held, with a National Show held at the Botanical Cardens, Manchester. The 1915 National Register lists only 8 shows, the National Show being at Holmes Chapel. It is thought that World War I brought about this near final demise of the Gooseberry Show. Not only did the majority of Gooseberry Shows become extinct, but so too did many of the different varieties of gooseberry. Regrettably, many of the prize winning varieties of the early days have long since been lost for ever.

Of the nine shows in existance today, only two are survivors from the 1893 National Register and the earlier heyday of the Gooseberry Show. Holmes Chapel is the oldest of the shows in the Cheshire area, and together with the seven other shows in that area its results are published annually by the Mid-Cheshire Gooseberry Show Association.

The Egton Bridge Old Gooseberry Society was established in 1800, but regrettably, records of early shows have not as yet been traced. The earliest results actually relate to the Whitby Gooseberry Show held at the White Horse and Griffen Hotel in Church Street, Whitby in 1856; that show being their sixteenth annual event.

The oldest known records of the Egton Bridge Show are for 1858, when Mr. J. Roggarth won with a Red berry of the "Wonderful" variety, which weighed in at 23dwts and 22grains. The show at that time was held at the Royal Oak Inn, now a private house, close to the present-day Horse Shoe Hotel and the stepping stones over the river.

Newspapers of 1861 refer to the Egton Bridge Horticultural Show, complete with an Egton Bridge Brass Band, though this appears to have been separate to the Gooseberry Show. In 1869, however, the Gooseberry Show changed its name to the Esk Vale Gooseberry Show and was held in the Station Hotel, Egton Bridge - better known today as the Postgate Inn. It is not known why the name or venue was changed, though it is possibly related to attempts to attract more members from the surrounding villages after Egton Bridge's railway station was opened in 1865.

In 1872 the Esk Vale Gooseberry Show moved to the Tunnel Inn at Grosmont. Grosmont was then a rail junction and so the Tunnel Inn would be even more accessible then the Station Hotel in Egton Bridge. By 1876 the show had reverted to its Egton Bridge name, and was back at its

its/

original venue, namely the Royal Oak Inn at Egton Bridge.

1892 must have been a year of celebration when the gooseberry shown by J. Shaw (a Ringer of 29dwt 19grains) not only proved the champion berry at Egton Bridge, but was also the heaviest gooseberry shown anywhere in this country that year. In 1896, Egton Bridge again produced a National Champion when W. Stamforth weighed in a Lord Derby gooseberry at 30dwt 5grains.

In later years the Horse Shoe Hotel was the home of the Annual Show, with the event taking place on St. Thomas's Island which is still part of the Horse Shoe Hotel's grounds. The traditional link between the Gooseberry Show and the local Inn is still maintained through the venue used for Committee Meetings. The Show itself though, has for a number of years been held in the Village School.

Only members of the Society are allowed to enter berries in the Annual Show, and anyone wishing to join the Society should contact the Secretary for details of membership and a copy of the Rule Pamphlet. The Society currently has some 120 members, the majority being local, though the most distant exhibitor is from Lincolnshire. The show is always held on the first Tuesday in August in the Village School. Admission is free, as is car parking, and Egton Rail Station is within five minutes walk.

The Show Room is open from 10.00 a.m. and judging, weighing, and the allocation of prizes takes place from 10.00 a.m. until 4.00 p.m. (last entries at 2.00 p.m.) Judges classify a berry by its colour (red, green, yellow or white) and identify the actual variety. Prizes are available for the heaviest berries entered in each colour, as well as for twin berries, and plates of 12 or 6 berries. In all, the 120 members make some 200 entries chasing some 30 prizes. In certain sections an exhibitor is only allowed one prize (with his heaviest berry), thus allowing a wider spread of prizes amongst exhibitors. The prizes are mainly household goods; kitchen equipment, or gardening equipment, and there are a number of trophies to be held for one year.

New members are called Maidens and can compete in both the Maiden and Open Sections of the Show. Once a Maiden has won a major prize, he progresses to the Open Class and, thereafter, can only win prizes in the Open Section.

Prizes are allocated purely on weight. Traditionally Gooseberry Shows used the Troy weights (as used by Jewellers) with 24grains to lpenny-weight, 20pennyweights to an ounce and 12ounces to a Troy Pound. All the old shows used this system, and the Cheshire Shows still do. In 1937 though, the Egton Bridge Society invested in a new oil damped balance and switched to the Avoirdupois weights with 27.34grains to ldram, 16drams to lounce and 16ounces to the Avoirdupois pound. This makes direct comparison of weights difficult, but a grain in Troy is the same as a grain Avoirdupois so it can be done!

A good gooseberry will weigh $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 ounces (Avoirdupois weights), and is the size of a golf ball. The World Record berry was shown in 1978 at Marton (Cheshire) and tipped the scales at 37dwt 15grains (equivalent to 2.06 ounces). The heaviest berry at Egton Bridge (shown

by Mr. B. Harland in 1985) weighed 30 drams and 22 grains (equivalent to 1.92 ounces). This was also the heaviest berry shown in England in that year.

The success of Mr. B. Harland in 1985 was a repetition of that enjoyed by R. W. Bennison in 1982, whose winning red berry established new records at Egton Bridge, as well as being the heaviest berry shown in England in that year. Indeed the Society itself is enjoying a period of successful growth, with membership standing at 120, the highest for many years. Increasing numbers of entries in recent years led to the introduction of an additional prize category in 1986. This is for the heaviest six berries shown by a Maiden grower and this prize was generously sponsored by Mr. J. Spenceley of Goathland.

Some members have exhibited berries for many years. H. Sanderson began in 1941 and was still amongst the prizes in 1986. However, you don't have to have years of experience to be amongst the prize winners. We are pleased to see some of the more recently enrolled members successful in the Maiden section.

The full display of prize winning berries takes place between 4.00 p.m. and 7.00 p.m. and this is the best time to visit the show when all the judging and weighing is complete. After the show room closes at 7.00 p.m. any remaining potted plants are sold to raise money for the Society's funds. Prize winners are presented with their rewards for their successful endeavours and finally, the raffle draw takes place. The raffle is the Society's main source of income.

If anyone has access to results or information about the Egton Bridge Gooseberry Show for any year prior to 1951, the Secretary will be very pleased to hear from you.

Further copies of this Register are available from the Secretary (price 50p. including postage). It is hoped that those interested in the Society will support us by buying a copy. All proceeds go to Society funds. Please encourage your friends to buy one.

It is intended we should produce a similar Register in 1987. Please support the Society by ordering your copy next year.
